I have been with Surrey Police for 15 years and have worked in a variety of different roles across response, proactive and neighbourhood policing. In my first couple of weeks I've enjoyed meeting members of the community and the team as well as seeing the wide array of work they do. I attended a meeting of the Reigate Business Guild and was part of an operation working with staff at East Surrey College to detect and deter weapons coming into the college and provide safeguarding advice to students.

To update you on the work the team have been doing recently:

- •As part of Business Crime Intensification week, PC Logan led a successful shoplifting operation in Banstead which resulted in several arrests and other interventions.
- •Sgt Heather continues to work with our partners and the community on the 'Clear, Hold, Build' initiative in Redhill. This is targets criminality, organised crime groups and anti-social behaviour.
- •Drink spiking intensification week saw us providing spiking prevention kits and educational material to venues to raise awareness and keeping people safe.

As the nights draw in, we historically see an increase in residential burglaries. I would ask the community remain vigilant and report any suspicious activity to us. There are simple steps that can be taken to reduce the chances of your property being targeted such as:

- •Use an automatic plugin time switch to operate a lamp or light at pre-set times when you're away.
- •Secure any side gate or access to rear gardens.
- •Ensure garden tools or items that could be used to easily smash windows or force open doors are locked securely away in sheds and garages.

Secure your number plates with tamper-resistant screws

The easiest way to change the identity of a stolen vehicle or avoid speeding tickets and parking tickets is to fit stolen number plates. Crime Prevention – **Adult and elder abuse**







Adults requiring care and support may not be able to protect themselves from abuse or neglect. We have specialist trained officers and staff who work to protect adults at risk of abuse.

Any adult can suffer abuse or neglect from anyone in their lives. Abuse can include physical abuse, sexual abuse, psychological abuse, financial abuse and neglect. For older adults, abuse can include coercive control, neglect or acts of omission, discrimination, modern slavery, domestic abuse and cuckooing.

Cuckooing is a term given to criminals who target the homes of vulnerable adults. They may use the property for any criminal purpose but in particular, drug dealing, sexual crimes and firearms. The vulnerable adult is often tasked to complete criminal acts, often under duress.

Adults within a care setting may also experience organisational abuse.

Adults requiring care and support may be at risk of self neglect and potentially may lack capacity to make decisions for themselves.

Report it

If you are worried that you or someone you know is suffering adult or elder abuse or neglect, please contact us immediately. We will investigate and ensure the person gets the best course of action to meet their needs.

This can be done:

- Online
- •By calling 101
- •In person at your <u>local police station</u>

Remember to always call <u>999</u> if you or someone else is in immediate danger.

If you have a hearing or speech impairment, use our textphone service <u>18000</u>. Or text us on 999 if you've preregistered with the <u>emergencySMS service</u>.

DVSA issues warning about parking fine scam text messages

Dvsa notice for you: You have a parking penalty charge due on 2024/9/30. If you do not pay your fine on time, Your car may be banned from driving, you might haeve to pay more, or you could be taken to court. Please enter your license plate in the link after reading the information, Check and pay parcking penalty charge.

Thank you again for your copperation. Dvsa.

The text messages warn people that they have a 'parking penalty charge', and that if they do not pay on time, that they might:

- ·be banned from driving
- •have to pay more
- •be taken to court

This is an image of the scam text that people have been receiving.

What to do if you received a message

You can report scam text messages to the National Cyber Security Centre.

Report a scam text message.

You do not need to contact DVSA if you have received the text message.

If you've responded to a scam text message

If you've been tricked into sharing personal information with a scammer, you can take immediate steps to protect yourself.

Find out what to do if you think you've shared personal information.

If you've lost money or have been hacked as a result of responding to a suspicious text message, report it:

- •at <u>www.actionfraud.police.uk</u> or call 0300 123 2040 (in England, Wales or Northern Ireland)
- to Police Scotland by calling 101 (in Scotland)

The crime statistics for the last 3 months show a variation in the number of reported actual residential burglaries. After a recent increase in the level of keyless car thefts, there has been a decrease in September. Although not shown, there were no catalytic converter thefts in the three months to September.
